"We are fortunate to teach at an independent school which does not require standardized testing. We have flexibility in choosing our standards, curriculum, and assessment tools. We use national, state and county standards as a starting point to create developmentally appropriate standards for our students. We continually update these standards based on the latest research and teaching experiences and look for new curriculum that will help us meet the needs of all our students."

"Our curriculum is both academically challenging and individualized to allow students to learn in different ways at their own pace. In addition, we are committed to creating a classroom in which students and teachers are having fun... We use motions as we spell words from the word well, play games to reinforce skip counting and place value concepts, complete mad libs as a way to learn parts of speech, and develop visualspatial skills through a giant floor maze. During the space unit, students learn what craters and ejecta are and also have the opportunity to create their own by dropping a variety of objects from the loft in our classroom into a bin of flour. We believe that when students feel safe and are relaxed and having fun, they will be the most open for learning and retaining more of what they learn." - Carolyn Howes and Judy Pellarin
